The turtle is recognized in the East and during the month of May.



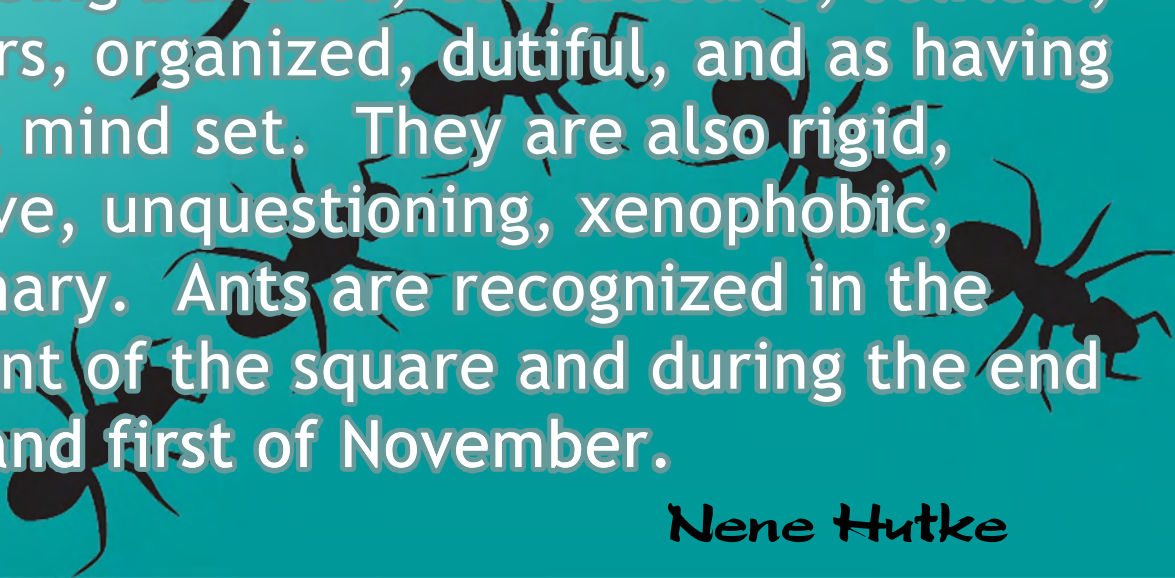
Nene Hutke

Viewed as being builders, constructive, selfless, turtle helpers, organized, dutiful, and as having a true tribal mind set. They are also rigid, unimaginative, unquestioning, xenophobic, and reactionary. Ants are recognized in the west quadrant of the square and during the end of October and first of November.



Wotko

pronounced
"wohd-koh"

Versatile, cleanser, self-reliant, tricky, sluggish and opportunistic. Represents cooks and food preparers because it washes its food. Also represents balance and order of day/night and growing/dormant seasons which is illustrated by the alternating bands on its tail. The raccoon is recognized in the northwest quadrant and during the month of January.

Talkative, highly social, industrious, active, curious, and prudent. Squirrels are recognized in the south quadrant of the square and during the month of August.
